If the MG TC defined the concept of light and affordable British sports car, the Triumph Spitfire elevated it to worldwide fame and presence. With British Leyland keen on an entry-level sports car, the Triumph Spitfire 4 only took 15 months to develop prior to being unveiled at the London Motor Show of 1962.

With direct competition from the Austin Healey Sprite, the Triumph Spitfire was superior with a more powerful Herald 1.1L engine, wind-up windows, and locking doors.

Named after the legendary WWII fighter planes, the Spitfire was a tremendous export achievement for Triumph. During its 18-year production life, approximately 317,000 Spitfires were sold, with around 75% exported to the global market and 45% alone being sold to the US market.

Rack Tightening Made Simple

We've all driven them — a Triumph that has a front suspension that has taken its state of independence a bit too far. I was in that exact situation recently. So, I decided to put down this revolt before there were some catastrophic results.

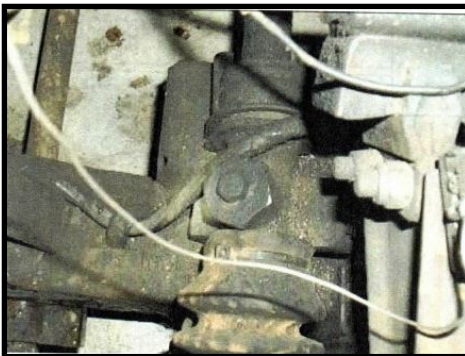
Adjusting the steering rack on the Spitfire and most other later Triumphs is simple. Find where your steering shaft intersects the rack. It'll look similar to the picture to the right. Loosen that big nut looking cap. A large wrench is advised for this.

Once the cap is off, remove a shim, fill the rack with grease, and replace the cap. If the steering has play still, remove another shim. Once there are no more shims, then you are also out of luck. Time for a new

steering rack at that point.

It's a very simple, quick and worthwhile task. Did it make a difference? Yes, it did. However, it also highlighted the fact my trunnions need to be replaced. I've had those parts for 2 years just waiting for this moment. That moment will co- incidentally be the next tech article from me!

So go out there and rack them up! Control of that wayward steering and suspension is a good thing.



1973 TR6 Lockup Find

Anybody that's ever-visited Arizona in summer knows it's hot! Damned hot! So when a friend called me early August 2023 saying he had found a TR6 in a lockup in Phoenix that had been sitting there for 16+ years I was not confident it was worth even visiting, but perhaps it was worth a phone call? It turned out, the owner just wanted rid of it and the price made it potentially worth the drive. So with a project car in mind I put down a \$500 deposit and set off to Phoenix.

When I arrived it had already been dragged outside - at least the wheels were turning and as a bonus they were holding air. Most of the engine was in various cardboard boxes in the back of the car. Every bit of rubber was dead, along with the cover. But the chassis and bodywork were good. In fact, its original paint (Sapphire Blue) was in reasonable although not great condition. With some effort I could manually turn the engine over so I had myself a new project.

In 110-degree heat, my friend and I loaded it onto a uhaul trailer and I set off for Austin. Vacation, life and the Austin heat meant I did not actually start working on the car until the start of November.

First things first: would the engine run? A quick temporary fuel system and new battery showed I had compression on the engine but there were some obvious issues.

The fuel line and fuel tank were nasty and stank of varnish. so a new tank was purchased and I ran a new nickel-copper line for the tank and reconditioned the sender unit and fuel pump.

The car came with twin Webers so I reconditioned them — no small feat as they were 32/36 DFV's which are both rare and hard to find parts for.

Next up was the sparkler system. As I previously said, every bit of rubber was dead so out came all the leads and cap for the dizzy. I had noticed that the dizzy was facing the wrong direction to the point that the rev counter cable could not be attached so I stripped and completely refurbished it while at the same time changing the vacuum unit to vacuum advance specifically for 32/36 Webers.

Onto the cooling system! All pipes were replaced (I wish I had found the green pipes at that point!) The water pump was original and not in the best condition, I looked at reconditioning it myself but

then found a guy in Oregon, Wade Jenezon, better known as The Flying Dutchmen “<http://water-pump-rebuilders.com/>” so I sent it there instead and it was returned two weeks later better than new.

In the meantime I ended up ordering a new radiator as every time I flushed the original one it appeared to get dirtier.

Next I dropped the sump and inspected the underside, only to find more stripped threads that were supposed to be holding the sump. I used helix coils to fix this. (There are few things that increase my heart rate, but drilling the engine block and the sealing block is definitely one of them.) After that I pulled the valve covers and went through all the gaps.

Now with everything tightened back up, I added a spin on oil conversion. When I fired up the engine, the timing appeared to be off even when I set it dynamically but could not take it out of the driveway until I had the brakes working. I changed the points to electronic but something still appeared to be off.

All the brake lines were dead, so I removed them and bought an Eastwood professional brake line flaring tool. My intention was to use stainless steel but I opted for nickel-copper alloy as it's so much easier to bend into place. I reconditioned the servo and the pressure differential along with all the calipers, bought a new master brake cylinder. I now had working brakes but a poor clutch, so I re-conditioned the clutch hydraulics at this point too.

In between times I had removed the seats (as they were toast) and bought Miata seats. These needed to be recovered and I needed to find a means of attaching them to the original mounts. I'm 6'4" so keeping the seat as close to the floor as possible was a must. With that in mind the mx5 seat rails needed an adapter to the original seat holes. \$180 for an aluminum machined set by Rick Patton did the job perfectly <https://www.pattonmachine.com/shop/miata-seat-mount-kit>.

The passenger side window would not go down. Removing and reconditioning the window rails and replacing the door pads was relatively simple but putting the door panels back together cost me a small fortune in the swear jar.

At last, I could drive her out of the garage. Dry rotted tires that are 16+ years old are not conducive to a comfortable ride so I purchased 5 new tires. The test drive was short due to the timing not being right and a very rough ride from dry rotted tires plus I noted a lot of play in the steering. I have timed many cars, old and new, but for days I could not get the timing correct on the engine. Vacuum leaks were the first issue and I realized the carbon canister had an issue and rebuilt it along with a new anti-run on valve. The second leak was internal to the master brake servo which had obviously failed internally and needed refurbished.

The play in the steering was from the rubber coupling in the steering column, it had split into two pieces but didn't take long to replace. At the same time I replaced the bushings on the rack with aluminum. So after the repairs were made I tried another test drive, and you could not have kicked the smile off my face! It was perfect (at least the engine was). The car accelerated in all four gears with no issue. The problem, it turned out, lay in the pulley damper which is not just one piece of steel with markings, but two pieces with a rubber separation. Over time, the wheel markings can shift. I added a new damper to my wish list.

On this extended test drive I realized that the suspension resembled a shopping cart, so as soon as I got home the car was jacked back up and the left side suspension front and back was pulled apart. With what I believe all the parts ordered I'm hoping to have the suspension rebuilt and the car back on the road for TXABCD in October.

In the future, I plan to remove the windscreen and dash pad and replace the dashboard. I have a beautiful walnut dashboard which was apparently made by a cabinet maker for his own car but never fitted. The original Stromberg carbs will be reconditioned but I'm not sure I will add them back to the car, but at least they will be there for the next owner to decide. I need a convertible cover as the old one has turned to a crisp but after my struggles with upholstery I'm not looking forward to this. Finally, the paint is beyond my ability and would mean paying somebody to repaint the car, but I think there is something cool (and cheaper) about a car that is over 50 years old and has original paint so for now the plan is to leave it be. From around 30 feet it looks fine.

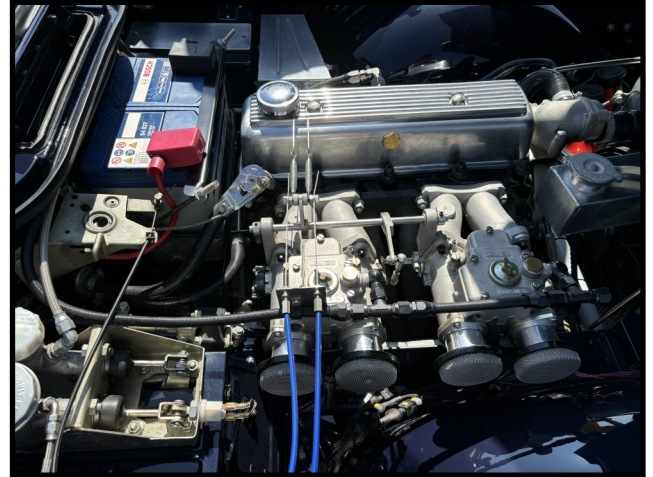

Frequently Asked Questions

Q: Is there going to a Vendor's Corner?

Q: Will Regalia be sold at the show?

A: Yes, Bits of Triumph will be at Late Registration Friday and at the show in the Vendor's Corner

Q: Can I register more than one car? Is there a discount for two or more?

A: Yes, you can register as many cars as you wish. No, there is no volume discounts.

Q: When does preferred-rate hotel registration end?

A: The Hidden Falls Inn will release any unleased rooms in the TX ABCD block two weeks prior to show

Q: Do I need a ticket to attend the Awards Banquet? Can I get tickets if I register late?

A: Yes, you will need to purchase a ticket for the Awards Banquet. Yes, but only up to the day prior to show. There will be no same-day purchases.

Q: Do I need a ticket for the Breakfast?

A: No, but we ask that when you are ordering tickets for the Awards Banquet to please check Breakfast box so we have an idea of attendance.

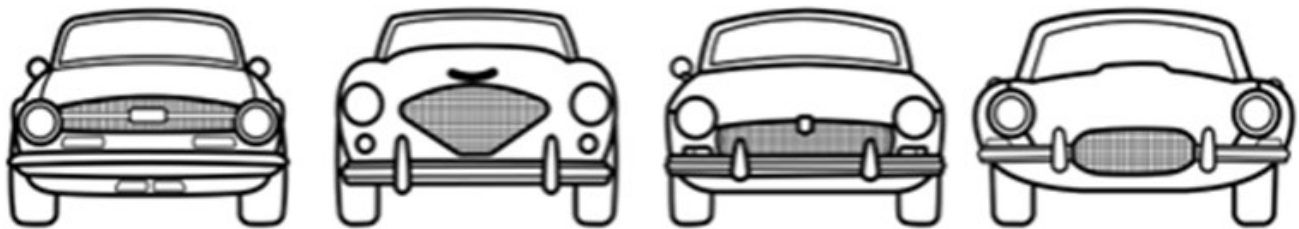

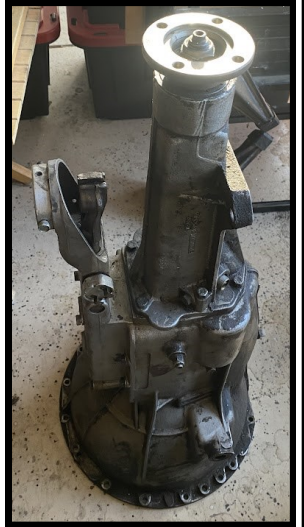
